Information on the band - Freight Blues

Freight or FreightBluesNZ is one of the Auckland Blues groups, and dates back to 2007. Marcus Wilson and Nigel Bioletti have kept the band going since then, but Lloyd Macomber, drummer, has been with the group since 2015, Ian Kettle, bassist, since 2017, and Kevin Harty, guitarist, since 2018. Nigel was born at Pentlands; Kevin and Ian live in Devonport, Lloyd works in Devonport, so there are good connections with this local community.

The group has a diverse repertoire of Blues numbers, centred on a Chicago blues style, with the two guitarists offering different styles, Nigel Bioletti adding the horn sound on alto and tenor sax, Marcus able to double on harp, all driven along by Lloyd and Ian. Marcus, Nigel, Kevin, and Lloyd share the vocals.

The band can play quieter laid back blues instrumentals and tunes, but then gradually crank things up to a full-on boogie. All of the tunes are great dance numbers. The band notices that people often start grooving from the first songs of a night.

The band has featured at the Bay of Islands Jazz and Blues festival. It's more a case of where the group has not played

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in Devonport, because over the years, their gigs include The Masonic; The Vic; Hemingways; The Patriot; The Sportsman's Bar; the Golf Club for a private function; Tiny Triumphs, and at the end of last year, the Clarence Street Fest. The band has also recorded at The Depot.

Obituary - Robert Upton



After a short illness Robert Upton died on 17th February at Ryman's William Sanders at age 83.

Robert arrived in Devonport three years ago having moved from Wellington to be near two of his four sons who live locally. While temporarily staying at the Captain's Landing he was fascinated by our haulage operations. He was invited to our Friday meal and became a member. He was keen to be involved in the community and joined the Folk Music Club, Devonport Walkers, U3A and the film group. He also joined the Croquet Club of which he was a top-level player. He had held a number of national championship trophies. At U3A Robert met Laurel who became his companion and accepted into his family which had expanded by several new grandchildren.

He was born in Bristol and was evacuated as a child to rural Wales during the War and was persuaded by his father to join the Royal Navy at age 16. After graduating from Dartmouth Naval College he served in Light Cruisers with a particular interest in gunnery. On one occasion he was in Malta and was offered the chance to jump ship and for a modest sum was offered his very own Pub. Before long he found out that five other shipmates had been offered the same deal. He retired from the Navy in 1968 with the rank of Lieutenant Commander and then worked as a computer salesman for ICL in London. In 1972 he emigrated to New Zealand where he was Comptroller for Gear Meat Works after which he became a small business owner in the plastics and screen-printing industries. He completed his working career as CEO of the Wellington Free Ambulance.

Robert was active in the Wellington community through the Masonic Lodge, Citizens Advice, Lions and Rotary and Rugby Club together with service on the school's Board of Governors for St Marks.

He is survived by his four sons and eight mischievous and energetic grandchildren.






Devonport Yacht Club Latest News emails

Two years ago we had the piano professionally tuned and at that stage were advised that it wasn't worth spending any more money on.





WILD SEAS TO GREENLAND

By Rebecca Hayter. Softback Published 2021.

A Sailing Adventure with Ocean Racer Ross Field.

When New Zealand ocean racing skipper Ross Field retired from professional sailing, he was already looking for his next, unusual adventure. In a dusty boatyard in France, he bought a 20-year-old aluminium yacht. She was a mess, but he knew the yacht was immensely strong. Ross named her *Rosemary*, refitted her for the high latitudes and set his sights on the Northwest Passage.


Yachting journalist Rebecca Hayter followed his refit in detail, and then she signed on as crew.

In this book, Rebecca recounts life on board, the highs and lows of ocean cruising, and her own personal challenges.

She shares Ross's war stories from famous yacht races, laughs at his jokes and observes his boat handling skills in the storms of the North Atlantic.

The central part of the story is set in the chilling vastness of Greenland Fjords: icebergs, whales and 'fishing boats that munch growlers for breakfast'
