

## A Fortnight's Cruise on the Hauraki Gulf



This booklet was written by Ernest Eyre about a trip round the Hauraki Gulf in 1915. At the time he lived in Tui Street but for most of his life he lived at 17 Wicklow Road. The trip in a launch described was more than likely a Devonport Yacht Club boat. Unfortunately the minute books for that time are no longer available.

There is quite a story about Ernie Eyre. When I bought the place off Ernie's estate as a 26 year old contemplating marriage, I found there were corrugated iron sheds along the western and southern boundaries. Ernie had collected the old Iron from houses that were being re-roofed. He simply added another layer to his sheds. Some had seven layers. My father organised the Rugby Club and a ten ton truck and the sheds and their contents of overruns of his published writing went to the Narrow Neck tip. Historian Paul Titchener told me that if I had saved the carefully wrapped bundles of poetry and fed it onto the market, I would have had enough to build a new house.

There is a collection of his writing in the reference section at the Takapuna Library.

He could not cope with life after his wife died and, in 1968, jumped off the ferry with sad results.



# **ENVIRONMENT MATTERS**

A monthly sampling of initiatives and issues large and small around protection of and improvement to the environment.

N o-one is denying the health of the precious Hauraki Gulf Marine Park /Tīkapa Moana/Te Moananui-ā-Toi (the Gulf) must be restored. In June 2021 its dire state was spelled out in *Revitalising the Gulf: Government Action on the Sea Change Plan.* "Some fish and seabird populations are declining, and nature's delicate balance is being upset. This has severe knock-on effects for other species and habitats. Extractive activities at sea, and activities on land that introduce sediment and pollutants, are also damaging marine and coastal environments." More recently, the Hauraki

Gulf Fisheries Plan Advisory Group (HGFPAG) was established in April 2022 to effect action. This forum is "the lead advocate for restoring the life-sustaining capacity of the Gulf, with members representing Ministers, councils and tangata whenua." (https://www.mpi.govt.nz)

There's also a lot going on at local level. While yachties don't confine their sailing to the area - Geoff Evans, past Commodore of Devonport Yacht Club (DYC), recently sailed to Aotearoa from Australia for example – they call the Gulf home. Its degradation can be grasped by the example of the kina barrens, says Geoff. "Because kina's

natural predators, like crayfish and snapper, have been so exploited by overfishing, the kina have taken over and wiped out most of the kelp beds. The lack of biodiversity is staggering." But this is not a reason to give up. "If you talk to any sailor, they understand the environment. They also realise you can't save the planet single handed, but individuals can be game changers, coming up with initiatives and getting others on board."

They walk in big shoes at DYC. Sir Peter Blake was a member and past patron, still celebrated for his dedication to looking after the environment and bringing attention to the degradation of the oceans. Lady Pippa Blake is patron of both DYC and the BLAKE NZ leadership programme, established in his honour after his death. BLAKE NZ is "designed to encourage and facilitate environmental awareness and leadership and instil a deeper sense of kaitiakitanga in young people." The DYC sustainability group (Geoff Evans, Paula Shelton, and Callum Ross) is working on bringing the environment to the forefront of members' thinking and actions and the connection with Peter Blake, Paula says, is a foundation stone and legacy for the way the membership is influenced and thinks about the environment.

Sustainability initiatives have become an increasingly important part of what is happening at DYC and include both practice





and theory. The job of those driving this is to make sure practices in running the club and taking part in activities related to the sea are sustainable. Members are encouraged to continue Sir Peter Blake's legacy and become involved in local projects to help restore the Hauraki Gulf environment. Callum Ross, for example, is involved in

For the past six years Geoff has helmed Seatalks, a monthly programme where experts from a range of fields address members and non-members, often acting as catalysts energising people to work towards sustainability. Examples include presentations by Dr Andrew Jeffs, University of Auckland staff member of the Institute of Marine Science and the School of Biological Science, who gave an update on

the Hauraki Gulf; Chief Executive of Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Alex Rogers spoke on how the Hauraki Gulf Forum promotes and facilitates the management, protection and enhancement of the Gulf; Shaun Lee, a designer, illustrator and phtotographer who is "pretty serious about restoration, conservation and pollution prevention" spoke on his work communicating the state of the Hauraki Gulf; Raewyn Peart from Environmental Defence Society spoke about the state of the Hauraki Gulf fishery.

The sustainability section of the DYC website, managed by Paula and Geoff, is key to DYC's identity as a club, with the health of the marine environment front of

> mind. Yachting New Zealand (YNZ), which coordinates the sport of yachting in Aotearoa, has followed in the footsteps of Green Clubs in the UK and US by launching the nationwide Clean Clubs project here in December 2021. The sustainability spokesperson at nearby Wakatere Boating Club, Narrow Neck, Paula and YNZ have collaborated on the initiative, and DYC have just become a threestar certified Clean Club. possibly the first in the country. There are five Clean Club categories administration and leadership, waste management, conservation. resource community outreach and education. Paula, Geoff, and Callum produced material

for a report on this, which Paula wrote. "A lot of it is about good management of resources, making sure you have processes in place to measure how well you're doing as a club." The YNZ website now provides resources on things like how clubs manage water resources sustainably, environmentally friendly cleaning products and sun block etc. https://www.cleanclub-yachtingnz.org.nz/

"On our sustainability page we recommend greener boating products," says Geoff, "and we're hoping YNZ will provide a directory of recommended products for all boaties. We now have an environmental policy for our club, and we want to mentor

other clubs to join the Clean Club programme. We're trying to educate ourselves about how to manage the maintenance of our boats in a much more sustainable but affordable way." He is very conscious of changes in boating over the years with so many more motorboats around today. "Through the club I'd like to encourage more sailing, which is more sustainable." Paula says the sustainability initiative has switched on a light. "We've discovered so many club members who care and thank us for providing a place to talk about it and ideas for action. We all want the Gulf to be there for our grandchildren."

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**Sally Garrett** - The challenges of operating in the Ross Sea and Southern Ocean today are the same as those experienced by Shackleton, Scott, and Amundsen. The Southern Ocean is known for its constant procession of low-pressure systems bringing gale force winds and extreme sea states. The Ross Sea is known for sea ice that is variable in thickness and highly mobile.

In February this year, DYC member Sally Garrett led a scientific expedition on board HMNZS AOTEAROA to study the waves and sea ice of the Ross Sea. She was also the forecaster on board, helping the ship navigate through the Southern Ocean. Come along for a talk about science, storm tactics, and other salty tales. Also, Sally Garrett is currently NZ Women's Keelboat champion!

Three adventurist Danes set off from their homeland on a three masted schooner to circumnavigate the world. Wherever they voyaged they seemed to attract most exciting episodes.






#### TO THE SOUTH POLE
