FROM THE QUARTERDECK

A REPORT FROM THE COMMODORE TONY BULLARD

This is certainly a far better summer than last year so for those of you with boats, or without, I hope you have been enjoying the wonderful weather. The racing season is coming to an end with just the singlehanded race to go after Easter. Good luck to all doing that race and it'd be good to see many of you out there on the water.

On the celebration front, we had a wonderful boating turnout for the Duder's Cup regatta and an absolutely fabulous ball afterwards. Beautifully organised by our Social Officer on the management committee — Emma Cliffe — and her hardworking committee. It was a night everyone enjoyed immensely and will remember for some time. We'll make sure we keep these highly successful celebration and social events carrying on into the future.

Last month Mark Sigglekow and I attended a Council Local Board to thank them for the grants they have given us in the past to build the new club rooms and upgrade the kitchen. The grant they gave us back in 2010 was substantial. Unfortunately, those generous days have probably gone but our relationship with council remains as our site is on Council land.

One of the purposes of our meeting was to tell the Local Board the significant value we provide to our members and to the wider community. Anyone, regardless of whether or not they own a boat, is welcome to become a member of our club and we make our various facilities available to community groups and individuals for various meetings, events and other activities. And of course, we are a tourist attraction and a significant part of the history of Devonport.

However, we cannot take our relationship with Council and with other groups for granted. The club is sited on extremely valuable public land on the coast and so are many other facilities and resources used by boating clubs throughout Auckland. There are other competing uses for this land and marine resource and it is increasingly coming under threat from alternative proposals or issues.

Our club is not under immediate threat as we have two more 10-year renewal rights to our lease. We have no rights to stay after this however. Other resources the boating community use are under more immediate threat. These include haulage facilities and anchoring places. Haulage facilities have been declining (The Landing, Little Shoal Bay and Pier21) and anchoring/navigation places threated by private mooring applications (outside of mooring areas), marine pests (such as caulerpa) and aquaculture. To ensure boaties' voices are heard we can do such as individuals, as a club, and via our club affiliation networks. Our weekly news informs you when opportunities come up to get involved. Please take those opportunities when they arise.

In addition, DYC is affiliated to two organisations that support and advocate for the boating community. They are Yachting New Zealand and the Auckland Yacht and Boating Association (AYBA). Both provide advocacy, support, training and networking.

In this issue I particularly want to focus on AYBA.

AYBA was founded in 1919 and the Devonport Yacht Club was one of its founders. There are currently 40 boating clubs that belong to the AYBA and the association has represented and advocated for these clubs and the wider boating community for nearly 100 years.

I have recently joined the AYBA management committee and want to share with you some of their recent projects, upcoming events and future plans. They were submitters and appealed against resource consents for the Bayswater proposal (which diminished the use of the area for boating facilities) and private moorings in Rakino. They took out legal challenges to the decision of the Orakei Board to remove the boat haulage facilities at The Landing. This made the Local Board rethink their decision. They hold informative talks for all club members (much like our Seatalks) and undertake several training courses.

AYBA is currently developing a new strategic plan to improve its relationships with our clubs, to strengthen its standing and influence with our strategic stakeholder and partners (eg Local Boards, Harbour Master, Council etc) and to influence the various council plans and strategies that protect and enhance facilities for boaties.

To find out more about AYBA, you can go to their web site and attend the frequent presentations they host.

Over the next few months, various member clubs throughout the region will be making presentations about their clubs so we better understand our fellow clubs and their issues. All are invited.

As it is nearly the end of the sailing season, the next phase will be hauling out the boats for their annual maintenance and the associated ritual otherwise known as emptying the wallet. The things we do for fun!

We have more fun events coming up over the winter months and the next is the laying-up supper which is always a great night for all members to get together.

So fair winds and smooth seas for all whilst you enjoy the last days of Autumn and get out on the water as much as you can.

February was a busy month's sailing commencing with over 20 boats competing in the Mahurangi Night Race followed by the Round the Islands race in Mahurangi.

The following week we had the Waitangi Weekend sailing events which were curtailed due to the weather. The single division race to Ponui was deferred to the Sunday, with the Round the Islands race in Ponui cancelled.

In complete contrast, the Duder Cup Centennial Regatta was extremely well-supported by club boats enjoying a good breeze and competition, with 23 different boats taking part in the race to win the Duder Cup plus two Classics classes. Loose Unit became the first boat to ever win the Duder Cup four times.

The final February race was a very light wind race to Woody Bay.

The series of races attracted around 40 entries from across Auckland, including classic yachts which made a spectacle rounding North Head.

In the cup race, Loose Unit was behind Kudos at the last mark rounding Motukorea Buoy. But despite slowing to graciously pick up a cap lost by Kaaren Rosser aboard Kudos, Loose Unit overtook its rival to claim line honours.

The evening featured a ticketed 1920s ball, attended by more than 100 people who enjoyed a dinner catered by Chateaubriant and dancing to the music of band Run for Cover.







Keith Gordon – The Wreck of RMS Niagara

Few realise how close World War II came to New Zealand. Yet 84 years ago German mines laid across the approaches to Auckland Harbour sank the luxury passenger liner RMS *Niagara* and led to a world record deep salvage of gold bullion.

Keith Gordon, President of the New Zealand Underwater Heritage Group, author of "Deep Water Gold" – the strory of RMS Niagara – has been directly involved with the shipwreck since 1989. His illustrated talk will cover the history of the *Niagara*, the German Raider HSK *Orion*, the sinking and subsequent salvage of gold from the wreck, plus exploration of the wreck in recent times and addresses the question whether the Niagara is today a ticking ecological time bomb in the depths of Hauraki Gulf?

Keith has been involved with underwater exploration for more than 70 years; he is a Fellow of the The Explorers Club and author of "SS Ventnor – Ghost Ship of the Hokianga".



TAPUI

A love affair lasting over 20 years has come to an end with the sale of the Couldrey designed launch Tapui (familiar spirits) which is moving up harbour to Te Atatu.

Built by Salthouse boatbuilders at Greenhithe and finished by her owners Tapui was launched down our eastern slipway in November 1980. A big volume powerful boat she is 36 foot overall with a beam of 12 foot and powered by a Gardner 5 L W diesel engine which has been downrated to 80 horsepower.




Before the advent of the wonderful V.H.F. coverage we have now, we used the S.S.B. radio and over the Xmas










UNCOMMON COURAGE

- The Yachtsmen Volunteers of World War II

By Julia Jones. Paperback

As World War II loomed, almost two thousand amateur sailors signed up o the RNVSR with little idea of what would be expected of them and for how long they would serve, but knowing that they were offering to risk their lives for their country.

Some were famous (such as Peter Scott and Nevil Shute) but most (such as the author's own father) were not. Some were wealthy (August Courtauld returned his pay to help the war effort) and others were not. Whilst some had extensive sailing experience, others had very little, and few could ever had dreamed that they would end up acting in areas that were so far beyond their normal lives, as they found themselves commanding destroyers and submarines, and undertaking covert missions of sabotage.

Some undertook the dangerous daily drudgery of minesweeping, others tackled unexploded bombs, engaged the enemy in high-speed attacks or played key roles in Ian Fleming's famous intelligence commandos

This varied crew of courageous men were given tasks requiring endurance, resourcefulness and quick thinking. Some died in the process, but for those who survived, their experiences inevitably changed them forever. Could their love of sailing and the sea survive the harsh realities of war?





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
