October saw the start of the 2023-24 sailing season. We welcomed a couple of additional boats to the fleet this year including Poseidon, a Stewart 34 and Weka, a Towson 30. We have already seen Bella Vita make an appearance in the first few races and we look forward to seeing them become regulars over the remainder of the season.

The first race in the calendar, aptly named the Ice Breaker, saw Zeppo take the honours for the orange division with Tumbleweed taking the green division. This was followed by the Motuihe race with Kudos coming out on top for orange and Spray II taking green. The round Tiri race, which ended with an overnight stay at Gulf Harbour, was raced in one division with nine entrants where Lidar and their very experienced guest crew took the honours.



THE DYC ANCHOR — A HISTORICAL RECOLLECTION

CHRIS LEECH IN CONVERSATION WITH NEIL HUDSON

The anchor that graces the Devonport Yacht Club starboard-hand entrance wall, and Western Slipway winch head, has a wonderful history. It was installed in place in this prime location in 1969 as a lasting memory and gift, if that word could be used, by Neil Hudson ably assisted by Colin Tubbs in the latter stages.

The anchor was retrieved from the sea floor where it had been abandoned just off Stanley Point in what is known colloquially as Rotten Row— the old Auckland Harbour Board dumping ground — and now lies in its final resting place.



Rotten Row was used to dump old AHB wire rope, chain cable, and even the William C Daldy bow fender — the very deep hole is still there today so, a small piece of advice from Neil to never drop anchor anywhere near this hole.

The anchor originated from the sugar boat the "Hudson Deep", lost when it was departing from the Chelsea Sugar Works on the North Shore bound for Australia when the skipper (Ben Jones) was ordered to stop and anchor to await and on load some last-minute stores. When it came to haul in the anchor it soon became evident that it had become fouled with some object on the sea



bottom. The skipper did the only thing possible, and he buoyed the anchor, and left it there along with a good length of anchor chain.

THE HUDSON DEEP

The following Saturday, Alan Hudson, who was then working for the AHB, was tasked with retrieving the fouled anchor. After a lot of work with the then AHB floating crane, the anchor was retrieved along with the abandoned chain and taken to the AHB stock holdings ashore.


Neil Hudson, who was then a member of the DYC committee, proposed that the club needed something at the road frontage that was clearly nautical, large, and impressive. He suggested that this recovered anchor be used for this purpose, and then arranged for it to be donated [!!] to the DYC by the AHB.


Neil arranged for it to be transported by small AHB barge to just off the Western Slipway and left it there to be hauled ashore at the first opportunity. So just before the next DYC working bee, Neil and his mate Colin Tubbs commenced to haul this up the slipway, but it became fouled (again), so after waiting for the tide to recede they successfully hauled it up.

At the next working bee it was moved with considerable help from fellow club members into its current location.

Neil was always one to ensure that the finer details were known about this anchor and added to the archives of the DYC. He contacted the Maritime Museum Greenwich and enquired about its likely provenance. He obtained the following information.

- It is pre-1850, and this is identified by the use then of the ring at the top, to the use of a shackle where the anchor cable would have been attached.
- The original anchor would have had a wooden stock, which was the custom in that period, and this was replaced by the current iron stock on or about 1850, when the old one would have perhaps rotted away. Some of the rivet buttons are still in place, and can be seen today, indicating that this change had taken place.
- It weighs approximately 2 tons.





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
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


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BUSY BIRD PARENTS IN THE HAURAKI GULF

Love is in the air! Across the Hauraki Gulf, Tīkapa Moana, birds of all shape and size are breeding, nesting and rearing their young. To help these parents with their big summer ahead, the Department of Conservation is reminding boat owners that dogs are not permitted on pest-free islands.

Here are a few success stories on Auckland's inner Gulf islands:

Motuihe – Several oystercatchers/tōrea pango have been sitting on their small, speckled eggs in November – right in Wharf Bay where many boaties arrive. Like many shore birds, these black birds with striking orange beaks nest on the sand between the high tide mark and the dunes.

Look out for the chicks in summer – they are speckled like their eggs. Useful tip: the parents feign injury or become loud and aggressive towards people who walk too close to their nests and young.



Spot the nesting oystercatcher – hint, quite hard to see!

Tiritiri Matangi – A few fluffy black Takahē chicks hatched in November. Adults usually only have 1-2 chicks annually. You might spot Takahē during summer in and around the lighthouse, especially as they love to eat native grasses.

The chicks will grow to around 2 to 4kg as an adult, and hopefully join the total NZ-wide adult population of around 500 birds.



Motutapu-Rangitoto – You can often spot Takahē in the grassy causeway area between the two islands – and if you're lucky you'll spot a chick that hatched in November. On the Northern side of Motutapu in a little bay called Pig Bay, next to Administration Bay, a few shore plover/tūturuatu chicks also hatched in November.

These small birds are deceptively strong fliers – one flew an 800km round trip from Motutapu to Foxton, just outside Wellington in September.

Safe havens

DOC, environmental groups and iwi partners work hard to translocate birds from across New Zealand to these safe islands. By establishing safe new populations, we hope to bolster the resilience of the species population overall.

These pest-free islands are safe havens for endangered native birds. They can relax undisturbed while they breed, nest, feed and raise their vulnerable young chicks.

This is why dogs are not allowed on any of the Hauraki Gulf's 47 pest-free islands – including the beach and foreshore. Even the smallest and most friendly dogs can stress and scare our coastal birds and dune-loving lizards at this very important time of year.

Let's let the wildlife be wild – leave your dog at home or on the boat.

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

Eyes on the Prize: Classic yacht clocks up a century

The 100th birthday of one of Auckland's most storied classic yachts, Prize, was celebrated at the Devonport Yacht Club

last Friday.

Owner and local resident Chad Thompson had readied the vessel with maintenance and a repaint at club's slippard on King Edward Pde, ahead of an event attended by around 70 people. "It was primarily aimed at the early crew," said Thompson, who has been sailing master of the Prize since taking over from his father, Bressin - who raced her with distinction in the post-World War II period.

The kauri 43-footer rigged as a "Bermidan cutter" was launched on 27 October 1923 and named after the submarine hunter 1923 and named after the submarine hunter 1923 and named after the submarine hunter 1943 which was helmed by Takapana-taised Lieutenant Commander William Sanders in World War I. Sanders, who won the Victoria Cross, later died at sea. Prize has been in the Thompson family since 1943, when Chad's grandfather Alf bought it from the family who had commissioned Charles Bailey Inr to design her. Her launch was covered in the Auckland Star with hopes she and others of her class would enhance the world-wide reputation of Auckland yach builders.

Today she falls under the Protected Objects Act, meaning she cannot be taken out of the country.

Thompson, now aged 73, grew up in Herne Bay and learned to sail out of Westhaven with his father. He has gone onto run a charter business with his Waiheke-based daughter and son-in-law and describes himself as a skipper for hir end an on-water tutor.

Prize was taken out of charter in 2002 but is regularly used by Thompson for classic-yacht racing with a crew of six to eight or cruisine with his wife. Marearet.

The couple moved to Devonport around 20 years ago, and soon became involved in the yacht club here. Thompson says the friendly club, which has clocked up its own 100th, is a great facility.

"It's good for John Citizen boat owners, not just the very wealthy."
Club and Classic Yacht Association members were among those who gathered to toast the Prize, which still holds a Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron (RNZ/YS) record from the 1950s of winning the organisation's pounts prize five times, four RNZYS. Another notable success was winning the Balokovic Cup in 1947, setting a new record which stood for many years. Her open racing days came to an end in 1976, when the squadron changed the rules on spinnaker size.

The proud owner has three adult children two of whom are keen sailors. Should he sell Prize in the future, his Waiheke-based daughter, Emily, and her husband, Robin would have first right of refusal, as the others are settled in Canada.

This is the fourth edition of this Cruising Guide, which was first published in 2000.


